This book is an entertaining account of Trumpism coming of age in the era of Obama. It's a well-researched description of the cultural landscape that culminated in the greatest feat of political confidence artistry in American history: the reelection of President Donald Trump.■

2008 - 2016

Several days after Mitt Romney made his limp-fish concession speech in 2012, Donald filed a trademark application for the phrase "Make America Great Again," the rallying cry and slogan for his 2016 (and 2020 and 2024) campaign. GOP bosses — who couldn't stomach Trump until they had to swallow hard after he won the nomination — floated several reasons for his rise. Most ridiculous among them was that President Obama had laid the foundation. Other than his Blackness, however, Obama had nothing to do with this despicable phenomenon.
